## **Tiverton Lions Club Fundraising for Autism Service Dog**

The Lions Clubs of Canada are a service club of volunteers who believe in the motto of 'We Serve', and the Tiverton Lions are putting that motto into action with the goal of helping five-year-old Lucas Mullen of Tiverton by fundraising to help his family purchase a specially trained Autism Assistance Support Dog. Lion Hank Van Moorsel explains.

"The Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guides program provides service animals trained in one of seven different areas. There are Canine Vision dogs, Hearing, Seizure Response, Service, Diabetes Alert, Facility support, and of course, Autism Assistance. In an ideal world the Foundation would always be able to meet the demand for dogs, but sadly, that is not the case. Typically, there is a two-year wait from the time the application process starts until the family gets matched with a dog, but the demand for Autism Assist dogs is such that currently we have a four year wait." That minimum four-year wait was one that Lion Sandra Parry, Lucas' mother, felt would adversely affect Lucas, so the family searched for alternatives.

"We contacted K9 Country Inn Service Working Service Dogs by Dundalk. Their program provides two dogs every two years, and we were able to get Lucas into their program. Typically, people will get to bring a puppy home when they are about eight weeks old, but Murphy, the dog we are getting for Lucas, has to be fully trained before he joins us. He will be able to stay with us for longer stints starting in March of 2026, but he will not be with us on a permanent basis as Lucas' Autism Assist Dog until he is two years old in September 2026."

Murphy is a Golden Retriever, once the training is completed, Murphy will be able to sense when Lucas' anxiety increases, and help Lucas by serving as a calming and grounding point of contact, but that is just a small portion of the role he will play. Lucas has severe Autism, is non-verbal and an eloper. Being an eloper means he will unexpectedly leave a supervised safe space or care of a responsible adult without warning. Additionally, he has a mental condition known as PICA, where he will eat items that are not edible. Once fully trained, Murphy will also be an anchor for Lucas, being tethered to Lucas when they spend time outdoors, and if Lucas tries to run away, he will sit, preventing Lucas from going too far. He will also alert an adult if Lucas tries to open an exit door, will return Lucas to an adult if he elopes, and will take items from Lucas that are inedible during a PICA incident. These skills require an immense amount of training hours, which means they carry an expensive price tag.

When the Tiverton Lions learned the scope of the expense that the family would be taking on to provide Lucas with much needed support, they wanted to help in any way they could, as Lion Hank Van Moorsel details.

"The Lions are working on expanding our Dog Guides Foundation, with plans underway to construct a new facility in Oakville in the next few years, but we understand that Lucas and his family need support now. There is the saying that it takes a village to raise a child, so we are hoping that people of Tiverton and area will get behind our thinking that it takes a village to help out this family."

The Tiverton Lions Club has a fundraising Easter Bunny Sale for \$6 each, with the funds raised going toward the Autism Assist Dog. ### Trades, robotic tools driving success

Bruce Power has wrapped up its inspection series and calandria tube replacement in its Unit 3 Major Component Replacement (MCR) Project, successfully deploying state-of-the-art robotic tooling in the reactor vault, leading to performance improvement and increased safety.

Leveraging cutting-edge innovation and operating experience from previous MCR outages, Bruce Power and its partners continue to make great strides in carrying out the life-extension program safely, with quality and on schedule.

As part of its deal with Ontario's Independent Electricity System Operator (IESO), Bruce Power has made a commitment to bettering its performance in each successive MCR outage and

is upholding that promise by placing these new tools into the hands of skilled trades. The successful renewal of units 3-8 by 2033 will ensure the people of Ontario will have access to clean, reliable energy for decades to come and that the economy in Clean Energy Frontier region of Bruce, Grey and Huron Counties will continue to thrive.

In a CANDU refurbishment record, 16 calandria tubes were installed into the Unit 3 reactor in 24 hours, and this new tooling allowed skilled tradespeople to set a record for the fastest complete installation of a Calandria Tube at 58 minutes.

The core skilled trades involved in this project were boilermakers, millwrights and electricians. Their work shifted from operating manual tools in the vault during the Unit 6 MCR

to focusing on commissioning, monitoring and maintaining the new robotic tools alongside a specialized Tooling Performance Team of engineers, programmers and nuclear technicians, to allow most of their work to be carried out outside the vault.

There are 480 fuel channels within Bruce Power reactors, each containing a calandria tube and a pressure tube, which contains fuel bundles. During previous CANDU refurbishments, installing 480 calandria tubes was a very manual operation. Teams were required to dress in three layers of Tyvek plastic suits and air respirators to rig and hoist each calandria tube onto a toolset before guiding and fitting them into the reactor. Today, a

remotely operated gantry collects the calandria tubes, delivers them to the automated tools, where they are then safely and precisely installed into the reactor.

Bruce Power and Ontario's nuclear industry continue to provide innovative solutions for clean energy projects to ensure the province will have access to safe and reliable electricity well into the future as renewed nuclear units are brought online.

They are also helping to drive the economy through made-in-Ontario solutions such as the six-axis robotic tooling we're using to refurbish CANDU reactors. The deployment of this tooling was the culmination of years of hard work and collaboration between Bruce Power, Shoreline Power Group, Calian Engineering and ATS Industrial Automation.



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### **Taking pictures in Bruce County**

In 1927 and 1928, the first moving picture "talkies" hit silver screens. With a new method called optical sound, music and dialogue could now be recorded on film alongside the picture.

Some of the earliest Bruce County theatres to feature talking pictures were Blue Water Theatre in Kincardine and Reenville Theatre in Walkerton. In a 1930 poem published in The Walkerton Telescope, the author included the talkie show among the many notable things that made their town a lively and fashionable place to be:

Girls dressed in their best
Keep a-strolling by,
Boys, in groups a-watchin'
Try to catch their eye.
Barber shop is crowded,
Can't get in the stores,
Talkie show is full
Clear up to the doors.
(excerpt from "Saturday Night in Town")
Within a few short years, the talkie



show had become a staple in many downtowns big and small. In order to delight audiences with the synchronized sound of talking pictures, however, theatres needed to invest in new projectors and sound equipment.

This ca.1930 Simplex-Acme sound projector was one of the earlier models equipped with the ability to read optical sound recordings. It was donated to the Museum by Harold (Jackie) Grasser, who managed The Esquire Theatre in Southampton during the 1940s.

A fixture of Southampton's High Street from the 1910s until 1974, the theatre went through many phases over its 60+years. Ownership swapped hands multiple

times, with some notable proprietors including John Blohm; Schilling and Keyes; Harold and Edna Poidevin; and Joseph Greathead. Originally called The Strand, its name was changed to The

Esquire in 1938. This artifact was likely the first sound projector used in Southampton, at The Strand during the 1930s and then at The Esquire during the 1940s.

### Still studying the benefits of NIR - near infared light

People often stop me in a grocery store and comment how well their woodstove still works. How lucky was I to be involved with such an industry. We would help homeowners select a wood-burning appliance, advise on location and design and install it. A product that would change their lifestyle.

I've always been intrigued by how well simple pieces of trees can heat a modest home, just right. It's almost like this was God's gift to mankind to stay warm.

Wood heating is not for everyone, but for those that embrace it, it provides satisfaction in knowing they will be warm no matter what mother nature throws at us. And its carbon neutral if done right.

But there is another attribute of fire that most people are unaware of, near infrared light (NIR).

The light spectrum that we see does not penetrate our skulls, so all our thoughts and brain activity are born in darkness. But research is now discovering that the sun does in fact penetrate our brain.

If you were to look at a scientific chart of the energy from the Sun, we can see only a sliver of visible light that we call the light spectrum. Next to the violet side of the spectrum is ultraviolet, (UV). We can't see UV but many animals can such as pit vipers which includes rattlesnakes and birds. We love birds because of their colours, but birds see themselves much better because they can see UV light. Of course, it's common knowledge that UV light on our skin helps us to produce vitamin D, but it doesn't penetrate our bodies or brains.

On the other side of our spectrum of light next to yellow is near infrared (NIR), which we also can't see. It does however penetrate our bodies and brains, but you need to be outside because it gets filtered out by the roof over your head. In adults it can penetrate our skulls, but due to body mass can't reach our internal organs. In small children it can penetrate their whole bodies.

Researchers are still studying the benefits of NIR, and there are many. In

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

any event, this should be a wake-up to spend time in the outdoors, especially children. The sun emits huge amounts of NIR, but to a lesser degree so does the moon. Many children spend far too much time indoors and artificial lighting from compact fluorescent and LED light bulbs, or TVs and computer screens do not produce NIR light. Believe it or not, the old incandescent light bulbs and candles produce a small amount if NIR.

As I've already mentioned, a woodburning stove with a glass door also emits NIR light.

# The Trails are Calling!

pring has sprung. The snow is melting, the birds are returning, and the daffodils will soon be poking their green stalks through the ground. And after this long Bruce County winter, what better way to shake off cabin fever than by getting outside and walking, hiking, running or cycling some of the – literally – thousands of kilometers of Bruce County trails.

You won't be alone in your pursuit, either.

Trail use is recognized as one of the top recreational pursuits in Ontario. According to the Ministry of Tourism, Culture and Sport, over 20 percent of Ontarians walk, run, trek and cycle the province's trail systems each year. And the number is growing annually. Bruce County is no exception. Every year thousands of residents and visitors alike make use of the area's wealth of natural pathways to commune with the great outdoors while improving their cardiovascular health, reducing stress, and even boosting their mood.

And the County has no end of trails to choose from. Be it the world renowned, 1300 km Bruce Trail that winds its way up the Niagara Escarpment, or the one km path that wraps around Fairy Lake in Southampton, hikers can get lost in Nature for an entire day or just an hour. Below is a sampling of what is on offer for those looking to get outside this spring and summer.

The Bruce Trail. Canada's oldest and longest marked footpath, the Bruce Trail offers an array of ways to explore the natural beauty of the Niagara Escarpment ... on foot.

The brainchild of pioneer conservationist Ray Lowes, the vision was to create a trail that

stretched from Niagara to Tobermory. Lowe got his wish. Working with provincial and local governments, private landowners, and like-minded volunteers, land approvals were obtained, trails constructed, and, in 1963, the Bruce Trail Association was incorporated. People have been traipsing the trail ever since. And whether you explore it on an afternoon hike or undertake the challenge of trekking it from end-to-end, walking the Bruce Trail is well worth the steps!

County Rail trail extends from the Bruce Power nuclear facility

up to Port Elgin, and from Port Elgin through the towns of Paisley, Walkerton and Mildmay. Built on railway lines that were used for train travel in the late 1800s and the first half of the 1900s, the Bruce County Rail Trail is a multi-use track that takes users past quiet farmlands, down wooded paths and alongside the Saugeen River. The Rail Trail has multiple access points and even boasts parking, outhouses, and benches along the route for taking breathers.

Kincardine Trails. For the past 25 years, the Kincardine Trails Association (KTA) has been helping local residents and visitors connect with Nature – one trail at a time. Formed from existing horse and cow paths, former railway lines, historic passageways and newly developed corridors, the stunning trail system takes users through, around and over the woods, ponds, rivers and neighbourhoods of Kincardine.

Broken into six distinct trails, the walkways provide challenges for every level of fitness. Walkers, runners and cyclists can traverse the KIPP Trail, trekking and pedaling up the Lake Huron coast from Kincardine to Inverhuron Provincial Park. Those choosing the Blue, Red and Green Trails can travel through ravines, along the banks of the Penetangore River, and past ponds where they'll glimpse dam-building beavers and nesting ducks. Then there is the Pink Trail, which takes users past the Kincardine lighthouse and Huron shoreline's oldest

> standing dance hall, the Pavilion; not to mention the still visible skeletal hull of the Anna Maria, a schooner that went to her watery grave in 1902. And for ornithologists, the Yellow trail loops through a bird

watcher's paradise.


And there are countless other trails to traverse in Bruce County. You can stroll from beach to beach along the Shipley Trail, connecting the Port Elgin Main Beach to Gobbles Grove Beach. 
whittled by forest nymphs - on the scenic walkway that loops around Fairy Lake in Southampton.

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

### A pedorthist's tips for enjoying spring

Now that the winter season is behind us - spring is finally here! Spring is a busy time for me as a pedorthist as many people find they have an increase in pain and discomfort. There are a number of reasons for this.

•Change in environment.
Our surroundings change

during these months as the snow melts away, the ground softens and plants and flowers start to bloom. Uneven paths and muddy trails are now the norm and our body and natural foot and leg stabilizers have to kick in and work over time to keep us upright. This can cause some overuse injuries if we don't take the time to adjust slowly.

•Change in footwear. This time of year we are typically throwing our boots and full coverage shoes to the back of the closet and pulling out something less cumbersome: Birkenstocks, Crocs, flip flops, loafers. This footwear is much less supportive and can often take our feet a while to get used to.

•Change in activity levels. Sunshine is shining and we want to enjoy it! Many people start getting outside for walks, running, hiking and biking. I'm not saying don't enjoy — I'm just saying ease into your activity if you haven't been as active during the winter months.

Often, these three changes result in an increase in pain and discomfort of the lower body. Sometimes this is something that our body adjusts to quickly, however if you find that your pain is lingering longer than you would like it to, it might be something to have assessed by a pedorthist.






## Curse of the Island Creeper - part four of the Cold Case Kids' series

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### **GBPH offers tips during Oral Health Month**

A pril is Oral Health Month in Canada.

This month-long event encourages
Canadians to have a better quality
of life by adopting better oral health
habits.

Basic oral health care at home includes:

- •Brushing twice daily for two minutes with a soft toothbrush and fluoridated toothpaste. Don't forget to reach the back and inside surfaces of the teeth and along the gumline.
- •Flossing daily to get to the in-between surfaces that a toothbrush cannot reach.
- •Using a fluoridated mouth rinse, which can decrease cavity susceptibility.

Regular brushing, flossing, and visits to a dental health professional can help to prevent tooth decay and gum disease. Eliminating tobacco use and eating healthy foods are also important for good oral health. You play the biggest role in your dental health.

For people who wear dentures, whether full or partial, it is still important to practice good oral care at home. It is important to maintain your denture, as you would natural teeth.

Grey Bruce Public Health recommends:

- •Removing dentures nightly to give your mouth a break. Overnight, dentures can be left in water or a denture-cleaning solution.
- •Cleaning your dentures with a soft brush and denture paste to remove plaque and tartar.
- •Individuals with dentures should visit the dentist at least once annually. This allows the dentist to check the mouth, tissues and fit of the denture and make any necessary adjustments.

Good oral health is key to good overall health and well-being. It can help you maintain a healthy lifestyle and prevent various diseases and conditions. Your oral health can also offer clues about your overall health and problems in your mouth that can affect the rest of your body. Periodontal disease, for example, has been linked to more serious illnesses, including lung disease, diabetes, and heart disease.

Eligible seniors from low-income households can receive free dental services through the Ontario Seniors Dental Care Program. This government-funded dental care program provides free, routine dental services for qualifying seniors 65 years of age and older.
